Achievements

The district has made progress toward its goals and recognized numerous achievements in the past year. A few highlights:

- **Nine schools in Good Standing**
 - Increase from four
- **Albany High graduate rate increased to 68 percent**
 - Up from 65 percent for the Class of 2017; fifth consecutive year with an increase
- **Student proficiency increased from 19 percent to 23 percent in ELA for students in grades 3-8**
 - A 21 percent gain
- **The district's first-ever Equity in Education Policy**
 - Adopted by the Board of Education on Jan. 3
- **Albany Marching Falcons selected to participate in the 75th D-Day ceremonies in France**
 - A great opportunity to experience history first-hand and perform on an international stage!
- **Albany High boys' soccer (#11) and girls' basketball (#9) achieved high state rankings**



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Overview

The annual school budget supports diverse programming, services and opportunities for approximately 9,300 students ranging in age from 3-21.

- Professional development opportunities aligned with our Vision, Mission and Goals
- Culturally relevant teaching and learning practices, restorative practices and trauma-informed care
- Full-day prekindergarten (more than 1,000 seats for 3- and 4-year-olds)
- Three themed elementary schools and the bilingual Dual Language Program
- STEM-focused initiatives that emphasize project-based, hands-on learning opportunities for all students
- Band, chorus and orchestra starting in third grade
- 60 athletic teams serving more than 1,100 students in grades 7-12
- Community Schools initiatives at six schools (Arbor Hill, Giffen, Schuyler, Sheridan Prep, TOAST and Tony Clement Center)
- AVID college- and career-readiness programs at Albany High and each middle school
- Programs that allow Albany High students to earn college credit while in high school
- Albany High's Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate opportunities
- A range of Career and Technical Education pathways at Albany High's Abrookin Career and Technical Center
- Albany International Center, an optional transitional program for refugee and immigrant students in grades 6-12

Tax Levy History

The 2019-20 proposal continues a six-year period in which the district has developed budgets with modest or zero tax-levy increases while enrollment has grown.

- This is the **sixth consecutive year** the proposed tax-levy increase has been **less than 2%**.
- The district's average proposed increase during that time is **0.86%**.

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Facilities Referendum Proposition #2

Voters also will have the opportunity to consider a facilities package that will have no tax impact.

Proposition #2 would:

- Renovate and expand North Albany Academy to create a permanent third middle school
- Support a five-year facilities plan that would address 87 projects at 18 buildings

Total proposed budget: \$45.6 million with no tax impact

- Middle school project: \$31.9 million
- Five-year facilities plan: \$13.7 million

Two-thirds of the funding (\$30.6 million) would come from state building aid. The remaining one-third (\$15 million) would be from district savings in the Capital Reserve Fund.

Note: Proposition #2 will require 60 percent voter approval, per State Education Department regulation.

- The proposal would put the district beyond its debt limit three times over the next 30 years.
- The state allows a smaller debt limit for small-city school districts like Albany (5% of total taxable property value) than it does for the vast majority of other school districts in the state (10% threshold).



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Board Elections and Voter Information

Two Board of Education seats will be up for election May 21.

- The terms of **Anne Savage** and **Damarise Alexander-Mann** expire June 30.
 - Both are seeking re-election and are running unopposed.

Two changes in voting locations:

- If you voted at Bethany Reformed Church or Mater Christi School in the past, your new polling place is **Maria College's McAuley Building**, 308 South Manning Blvd.
- If you voted at Albany High School in the past, your new polling place is **Abrookin Career and Technical Center**, 99 Kent St. (two blocks north of Albany High off Erie Street)

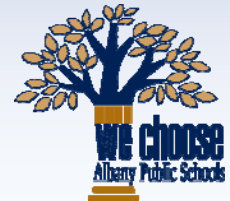
